Project Overview

FCEM Education is a European initiative that connects art, culture, and education through international collaboration led by women working in the creative industries.

Its goal is to strengthen women's leadership in the cultural sector, support young people, and foster open intercultural dialogue.

Why This Project?

FCEM Education responds by building a network that integrates artistic creation, mentoring, and education. Art serves as a tool for communication, professional growth, and social cohesion.

What the Program Includes

The project is built on four main pillars:

1. International Residencies

Short-term residencies for artists and cultural professionals focused on collaborative creation, knowledge exchange, and public presentations of outcomes.

2. Inclusive Education Programs

Creative workshops for teenagers facing social or health-related challenges. The program develops creativity, self-confidence, and teamwork skills.

3. Women's Leadership and Mentorship

A professional development program combined with one-on-one mentoring that connects emerging cultural professionals with experienced gallerists and cultural managers. The goal is to strengthen leadership skills, strategic thinking, and international collaboration.

4. Traveling Exhibitions and European Network Building

Presentation of collaborative projects in partner countries, alongside the systematic development of a long-term European cultural network.

A Scalable and Sustainable Model

The project combines mobility, mentorship, inclusive education, and network-building. The model is adaptable across countries and supports long-term cooperation among partners. Its objective is to establish a stable European platform that promotes creativity, professional development, and cultural dialogue.

Project Mentors

Each participating country appoints a reference gallerist who serves as a professional lead within the project. Their role includes guiding residencies, mentoring emerging professionals, providing expert consultation, and connecting participants to international networks.

Current reference mentors include:

- Claire Le Gouill, founder of Art De Claire Galerie (France), specializing in the international presentation of contemporary art and cross-border artistic exchange.
- Jennifer Houdrouge, founder of Selebe Yoon (Senegal), recognized for connecting African and European cultural scenes and supporting emerging artists through international dialogue.

Together, these mentors form the foundation of a dynamic international network that supports the circulation of artists, ideas, and cultural collaboration across borders.

Financing: Each country would need to secure its own financial resources, i.e. each country can then adapt the concept according to its own circumstances, opportunities, and available funding.

The project is funded through a diversified structure to ensure stability and long-term sustainability, including:

- Contributions from partner galleries and institutions
- Internal resources and membership contributions within the FCEM network
- Private sponsorship and patron support
- Partnerships with companies in the creative and business sectors
- Fundraising initiatives and public events
- Institutional support at national or European levels, where applicable

This diversified funding structure provides flexibility, independence, and the capacity for gradual expansion into additional countries.
